

LEA Plan for Safe Return to In-Person Instruction and Continuity of Service

Pursuant to the Federal American Rescue Plan Act, Section 2001(i)

Introduction and Background

As announced in the New Jersey Department of Education (NJDOE)'s [April 28, 2021 broadcast](#), in March 2021 President Biden signed the Federal [American Rescue Plan \(ARP\) Act](#), Public Law 117-2, into law. The ARP Act provides an additional \$122 billion in Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ARP ESSER) to States and school districts to help safely reopen, sustain the safe operation of schools, and address the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic on the nation's students. As with the previous ESSER funds available under the Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act, and the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act (CRRSA), the purpose of the additional funding is to support local educational agencies (LEAs) in preparing for and responding to the impacts of COVID-19 on educators, students, and families. Section 2001(i)(1) of the ARP Act requires each LEA that receives ARP ESSER funds to develop and make publicly available on the LEA's website, no later than 30 days after receiving ARP ESSER funds, a plan for the safe return to in-person instruction and continuity of services for all schools (Safe Return Plan) A Safe Return Plan is required of all fund recipients, including those that have already returned to in-person instruction. Section 2001(i)(2) of the ARP Act further requires that the LEA seek public comment on the Safe Return Plan and take those comments into account in finalization of the Safe Return Plan. Under the interim final requirements published in [Volume 86, No. 76 of the Federal Register](#) by the U.S. Department of Education (USDE), an LEA must periodically, but no less frequently than every six months through September 30, 2023, review and, as appropriate, revise its Safe Return Plan.

Pursuant to those requirements, **LEAs must submit to the NJDOE and post on their website their Safe Return Plans by June 24, 2021.** The NJDOE intends to make LEA ARP ESSER Fund applications available in EWEG on May 24, 2021 and LEAs will submit their Safe Return Plans to the NJDOE via EWEG. To assist LEAs with the development of their Safe Return Plans, the NJDOE is providing the following template.

This template incorporates the federally-required components of the Safe Return Plan. The questions in the template below will be included in the LEA ARP ESSER Fund application in EWEG. LEAs will submit responses to the questions within the LEA ARP ESSER Fund application in EWEG by June 24, 2021. The NJDOE hopes that this template will allow LEAs to effectively plan for that submission and to easily post the information to their websites as required by the ARP Act.

Note that on May 17, 2021, Governor Murphy [announced](#) that upon the conclusion of the 2020-2021 school year, portions of Executive Order 175 allowing remote learning will be rescinded, meaning that schools will be required to provide full-day, in-person instruction, as they were prior to the COVID-19 Public Health Emergency. The NJDOE and New Jersey Department of Health (NJDOH) will share additional information regarding State requirements or guidance for health and safety protocols for the 2021-2022 school year as it becomes available.

1. Maintaining Health and Safety

Physical distancing in the classroom and on buses in accordance with CDC and state guidance is still encouraged and supported to the extent practicable. D. Cleaning and maintaining healthy facilities, including improving ventilation

The district has invested in HVAC repairs and upgrades. The ventilation systems meet recommended safety requirements, and filters are changed regularly. Windows have been left open, when possible, to enhance ventilation. The district's maintenance staff does all of the recommended preventative maintenance on the HVAC systems, air scrubbers, and recommends repairs and upgrades to the systems as needed.

The district continues to follow disinfection protocols based on state guidance. As part of the daily work schedules for custodians, when opening the building, key sections will be cleaned first. Restrooms will be cleaned a minimum of two times while school is in session and one time after the building is vacated for the day. High-touch areas will be cleaned as often as possible while school is in session and again after the building is vacated for the day. Each area will be cleaned additional times, as necessary. Parents are encouraged to send students to school with a bottle/container of water. Head custodians will monitor all building needs and act on all requests. The district will limit the use of shared objects when possible. Any shared objects including desks and technology will be cleaned as needed. All soap and hand sanitizer stations will be checked and refilled/replaced as needed. Students will be encouraged to wash their hands with soap and water or alcohol-based hand sanitizer throughout the day. Signage has also been posted throughout the buildings to encourage hand washing.

The plan may be updated in accordance with CDC and state guidance and in consultation with our local health official.

E. Contact tracing in combination with isolation and quarantine, in collaboration with the State, county, and local health departments

The District will continue to collaborate with the local health department and engage its school nurses. Contact tracing and isolation/quarantine procedures will be based on the district's numbers. Contact tracing will only be used when needed and recommended by the local health department. Communication occurs daily/weekly with the Lyndhurst Health Department. The district also routinely communicates with the local recreation department to track cases. Students and staff who test positive will isolate, quarantine and return to school based on the NJDOH quarantine protocols for K-12 Schools.

F. Diagnostic and screening testing

Parents are strongly encouraged to monitor their children for signs of illness. Students who are sick should not attend school. If any child is exhibiting COVID-like symptoms or tests positive for COVID-19, parents are instructed to inform the school health office immediately. The same protocol applies to employees. Employees should monitor their symptoms and not report to work if they are not feeling well. If an employee tests positive for COVID-19, the employee must inform the school health office or immediate supervisor

The district's Nursing Staff and the Lyndhurst Health Department will continue to make local facilities known to the school community.

G. Efforts to provide vaccinations to educators, other staff, and students, if eligible

The district continues to work closely with the NJDOH and our local health department in disseminating information to the community regarding vaccination and booster clinics. As a result of Executive Order 253, vaccination status is collected for all staff who are in the school buildings on a regular basis. The executive order requires all staff to be fully vaccinated or undergo weekly testing by October 18, 2021, and the district has developed procedures and practices to ensure compliance.

H. Appropriate accommodations for children with disabilities with respect to the health and safety policies

Consideration and reasonable accommodations will be given to students who are considered medically fragile or present with other significant needs related to their ability or health status, including but not limited to students with IEPs, 504 plans, or IHPs. If a parent makes a request for accommodations based on a serious underlying medical condition, the district will require families to provide medical documentation. Medical information will remain confidential in accordance with all applicable laws. Appropriate accommodations for children with disabilities are discussed with the IEP team and handled on an individual, case-by-case basis. In accordance with state and federal guidelines, students who are eligible for special education and related services will be provided with a free and appropriate public education (FAPE).

The district will provide appropriate individualized PPE for staff and students as appropriate and necessary.

2. Ensuring Continuity of Services

The Lyndhurst Public Schools will continue to implement interventions that will ensure continuity of service, including services that address students' academic needs, and students' and staff's social, emotional, mental health, and other needs. Our school district continues to increase the number of mental health supports available to our students. Staff's social, emotional, mental health, and other needs will be met through a variety of professional development opportunities offered throughout the year. Academic needs will be met through rigorous instruction, a variety of courses and levels to select from, along with a plethora of elective-type courses in the arts and other areas. The district is aware of and is committed to ensuring students are on track to graduate and that learning loss as a result of the pandemic is mitigated. The district will therefore be offering after-school and lunch tutoring programs for identified students. Students at all three levels of the school district will use benchmark assessments to establish baselines. This will give district personnel the ability to determine proficiency rates of students in comparison to state/nationally normed data. Different interventions will be implemented during the year, including learning acceleration academies, intervention opportunities, and other forms of group tutoring. This will assist students who are in academic need. Memorial School was re-opened in 2021-2022 school year to reduce class size for our K-2 population, an additional grade 4 class was created to also reduce class size.

3. Public Comment

In addition to welcoming public comment at the Board of Education meeting on June 29, 2021, the district also disseminated a survey on Friday, June 11, 2021 to all staff and parents to provide them an opportunity to share their input. We also hosted a Community Feedback Forum on June 17, 2021.

During the November 30, 2021 board of education meeting, the public was informed of the district's planned use for ARP-ESSER funds. The use of ARP-ESSER funds was also posted on the district website.

During the summer of 2022, the community had an opportunity to review the revised Safe Return Plan and ARP-ESSER use of funds. Community feedback was collected through a brief survey, and public comments were welcomed at the August 30, 2022, board meeting. Also, the district will post its plan on the district website for community members to view at their leisure. At any point, members of the community may submit feedback to the Assistant Superintendent's office.

District administration will present to the Lyndhurst BOE and the public about any changes necessary to the plan based on ongoing guidance from NJDOE and NJDOH.
